DEVOTION less of a 'devotion' this week and more of a 'thought' for the season Christmas TV is always a bit of a mixed blessing – it can be wonderful, or it can be that you can't find much you really want to watch. This year, it may be more of a saviour from loneliness than in other years. Another of my little Christmas 'rituals' is buying the Christmas Radio Times. This year's has an article by the new Archbishop of York Stephen Cottrell (no stranger to writing Christmas and Advent material) and I share some of his thoughts:

Reflecting on *Gogglebox*, one of his favourite shows, he says, "It turns out that television is not the passive intruder into home life that we sometimes think it is, but a companion. Even a friend. And British television in general – and the BBC in particular – is, like the very best of friends, not just there to entertain you, but also to educate and inform." This "is as relevant today as it ever was. It is also under threat. The echo chambers of social media and the fake news that often goes with it have led us to mistrust and cynicism...Truth itself seems to have become a commodity, bought by the highest bidder." He says that along with the NHS, public service broadcasters (like the BBC and Channel 4) "are a precious part of our cultural ecology. They help us to see ourselves clearly. ... many lonely, frightened and isolated people have turned to the television (and the radio) for help, companionship, relief and guidance." "There is one other place this year where we watch other people watching, and that is the Christmas story. When we observe and tell the Christmas story, we watch Mary and Joseph respond to the call of the angels and the birth of Christ. We watch the angels visit the shepherds... we watch the arrival of the wise men. On *Gogglebox* we see a glorious, diverse picture of the United Kingdom...that same glorious, diverse humanity is also invited to the manger. Gathered there, we can look around and discover that we belong to one another. We are one humanity."

TIPS & IDEAS

The fourth (and final) exercise from Five Impossible Things to Believe Before Christmas by Kevin Scully

4. "The crack in the universe"

Scully says that "to love the danger from the nativity story is actually dangerous to our faith: it sells short the disruptive quality of the birth of Jesus." One of the most unbelievable tenets of our faith is that God became human. Yet we run the risk of "being drawn away from the wonder and staggering import of Emmanuel, God with us, to the saccharine and the too-easily-embraced." Over familiarity with the nativity stories can cause us to forget or gloss over the truly amazing act of God becoming human. With this year's very strange Christmas, we have the opportunity to focus again on the real message.

* "Find an image of the stable in Bethlehem. Find a place in the scene for yourself, imagining yourself as an extra, unportrayed presence. Sit with the scene for some time and then offer the following prayer:"

All powerful God, who became helpless in Bethlehem; give strength to our weakness, hope to our doubts, repair to our brokenness that we may become at one as you are at one, Creator, Redeemer and Sustainer. Amen
