The summary and questions for this week were in last week's N&C. Here is next week's:

#### **Week 4 (18 March) Coming out of Denial and Facing Crisis**

Many people are in denial about climate change, or at least the extent of it and how much we as individuals can do about it. The problem may be **fear** – that if we accept it, our lives would have to change significantly. That it's too big a problem to contemplate. Fear can lead to apathy and thinking there is nothing we can do about it.

Illness and death usually results in people evaluating their lives and deciding what is really important. What if we thought of the planet as a dying relative?

The first Christians believed they were living in the end times...It would be a time of great suffering, when people's faith would be severely tested. So St Paul challenged people to change their ways. We now stand under God's judgement for the mess we are making of Creation. We also need to change our ways.

**What can be done?** 'We have to lobby our politicians, who alone have the power to enforce the changes that need to be made.' They will only act if they feel enough of their constituents are really concerned about climate change.

Air travel is the fastest growing source of carbon dioxide emissions, yet the aviation industry enjoys zero tax on jet fuel and zero-rated VAT on plane tickets. Should we be lobbying government to change this situation post-pandemic? Should people be dissuaded from flying?

#### **Questions**

1. What do you think about the idea of denial? Do you think humans are not good at coping with crises?
2. Does prayer help you face reality? (or deny more – leave it to God to sort out)
3. **Read Romans 8:35-39** What difference should our faith make to the way we think about climate change?
4. Have you ever lobbied your MP? Did you feel it was worth it?



#### **TIPS & IDEAS**

This week's weekly challenge from #64Million Artists is a bit challenging! But I share it because it is topical (Monday was International Women's Day and Sunday is Mother's Day), and just because something is hard doesn't mean we shouldn't have a go (and maybe you won't think it is hard to do!):

#### **Celebrate a woman that you admire through the medium of collage!**

It could be someone you know or someone you don't know, a family member, a public figure or a fictional character. Use any materials you have around you!

Your collage could be a portrait of them or an image that represents their impact on you. Experiment with layering - paper, fabric, drawing, painting, their words, your words, and thoughts or snippets of conversation that tell their story. Or, you might want to simply write something about a woman you admire.

### **For Christ Church only – the building and mission plans, meeting on 14 March**

We have now had three focus groups and received many opinions via email and phone, so I would like to clarify some matters that have been raised, so we do not need to spend so long on them in the meeting on Sunday 14 March.

#### **Join with another church:**

Although only 2 people have mentioned this - there is no plan in the foreseeable future to join with the Methodists. This would be a very long and complicated process and would of course require the Methodist's to express an interest! It would also then result in a LEP (local ecumenical partnership) not simply the sharing of a building.

**Whatever else we may or may not decide to do, the essential repairs will be undertaken.**

#### **Insulation and environment/Eco-Church**

Insulating the church building and making it as environmentally sustainable as possible is part of the plan.

#### **Funding**

We will be eligible **to apply for** (and likely to receive, though we cannot count our chickens...) a grant from Synod for at least 50% of the required and any new work. There are also several other funding bodies we can apply to for grants (the Elders have already investigated some and are looking into others) and we can apply for low interest loans from Synod, so any fundraising from the congregation would be more with the aim of getting the congregation involved in the project rather than necessarily raising a huge amount of money, **though we need to recognise that it is unlikely that all funding will be provided by grants**, and that there are members of the congregation who are willing and able to make donations.

#### **Sensory garden**

Sound and pollution from the road are issues with a 'sensory garden' but the idea is not simply about plants and a place to sit, but all the senses - so different surfaces in the ground, a mural with bright colours, possibly a sound sculpture and other options including finding a use for the eco-bricks the church made from plastic bottles some time ago, which in general would make the outside of the church look more open and welcoming and represent that we are an inclusive church (in all senses, no pun intended!). Sensory gardens (garden is perhaps a misnomer implying a traditional garden with lots of plants) are known to be very beneficial to people with learning difficulties and visual impairments and need not require much space, nor cost much money. Our 'gardening team' already have lots of ideas!

It is quite hard to visualize what the plans would look like, especially for the outside of the church. The next stage of the process is to appoint an architect who will provide plans, drawings and a schedule of planned work to enable the congregation to set priorities. It is at that point that Church Meeting would make decisions. It is probably not too helpful therefore to get into a great deal of detail at this stage. This initial stage is simply an exchange of ideas, no formal decisions will be made at the meeting on 14 March.
