Readings: Psalm 1 and John 17:6-19

In our reading from John's gospel we find Jesus coming to the end of his earthly ministry and his time with the disciples. We find Jesus praying for the disciples and he says in his prayer that "I have given them (the disciples) your word and the world has hated them, for they are not of the world any more than I am of the world. ¹⁵ My prayer is not that you take them out of the world but that you protect them from the evil one. As you sent me into the world, I have sent them into the world."

What does it mean for us as followers of Jesus to be sent by Jesus into this world but at the same time not to be part of the world?

Let's start by being clear what it doesn't mean. To be in the world but not of it does not mean we should hide away and do everything possible to live in isolation from the rest of the world. Just the opposite. As followers of Jesus we are called to be actively involved in daily life and to engage with the suffering, mess, greed and inequality that we see around us every day. We are called to speak out against injustice in whatever form it takes and to challenge those in positions of power and authority to make the changes that are needed to make this world a better place.

But alongside this Jesus also calls us to put him first in our priorities and not to allow ourselves to become so engaged with the world that we lose our identity as followers of Jesus and end up living by the standards of this broken world.

So how can we be engaged in the realities of this world but also remain completely loyal to God?

According to the psalmist in our reading from psalm 1 we must be like trees planted by streams of water. Here, the author describes fruit bearing trees with deep roots that have a constant water source. Ancient Israel was a largely agrarian society that understood prosperity in terms of agricultural production and weather.

Trees need water. New trees need 10 to 20 gallons per week during the dry season. Water availability has a direct impact on the health of forests and their inhabitants, which shows the importance of the relationship between forests and water. Trees are made up of more than 50 percent water and need a steady source of it in order to grow and stay healthy. A healthy 100-foot-tall tree can take 11,000 gallons of water from the soil and release it into the air again, as oxygen and water vapor, in a single growing season. They "drink" in the water using their small, hair-like roots. Water from the soil enters their roots and is carried up the tree's trunk all the way to the leaves.

Water is commonly understood as a biblical metaphor. Here, water is a constant source of nourishment for the tree—which symbolizes humanity and life. This means we need to be constantly drawing our nourishment from God and his love and provision for us. This will enable us to be strong and secure in our faith and our relationship with God and to withstand the battering that we will sometimes receive in this life – much like a well-rooted tree.

In order for us to draw our nourishment from God we need to be daily in touch with God through prayer and reading God's word in the Bible which will help to guide us in how to respond to situations we find ourselves in and how to follow God's ways.

Once we're receiving our constant nourishment from God we can then find ways to actively engage with those who are in positions of power and leadership in politics, industry, technology and so on to seek to bring about change for the good of all. But in doing this we must also ensure that our first loyalty is to God and to following God's principles.

We as Jesus' disciples are called to be agents of change to bring about God's kingdom of justice in our world. In the letter from James we read that 'Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world.'

But knowing how to bring about change can be a daunting thought for us and we may feel inadequate in our knowledge and skills to try to engage with those in positions of power. Naomi is currently running a series on Thursday evenings called 'How Change Happens'

which takes a step by step approach to help us learn more about the Biblical basis for making change happen and how we can play our part in this.

When we start challenging some of the systems and processes that create injustice and inequality in the world we can find we are exposed to criticism and challenge. In our reading from John's gospel, Jesus prays to God for the disciples to receive God's protection constantly once Jesus is no longer with them and we too can be confident that we will never be separated from God's love no matter how challenging the situation is that we are facing. Paul writes in Romans chapter 8 that 'neither height nor depth nor anything else in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.'

Jesus also asks God to enable the disciples to be as one, just as Jesus and his heavenly Father are one. It's important that as Christians we work for unity between ourselves so that we can overcome any divisions and differences and not allow anything to distract us from doing God's work and following Jesus.

And throughout every part of life and every situation and challenge we face Jesus longs for us to have the full measure of his joy within us. Paul encourages us in Romans chapter 12 to 'be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer'.

God is sending us as his followers out into the world to bring love, to challenge injustice, to take action against greed and exploitation. What does this mean for us and our churches at this moment in time? How might we respond to being sent out by God into our world in light of the continuing pandemic and the climate crisis?

Let's pause for a moment of quiet to reflect on those questions.

As we follow the call of Jesus to go out into our world, we do this in the knowledge that we are surrounded by the love and protection of God through Jesus. So let's go out in confidence, hope and faith.

Thanks be to God. Amen
