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Welcome to worship from The Bridgwater Drive Church. Today will be a Communion service here at Bridgwater. If you are a member of Christ Church watching at home and wish to celebrate the Lord's Supper, you may, however the Christ Church monthly communion was celebrated last week.

### **Bible readings: John 3:1-17**

#### **Romans 8:12-17**

Today is Trinity Sunday. When I was a student, I used to joke with the minister of my home church that I would have to be either ill or on holiday every Trinity Sunday because I didn't understand it! But the point, I think, about the Trinity is that it is a mystery; we're not really meant to understand it, and it is one of the few aspects of mystery that the Western church still has. If anyone claims to be able to explain the Trinity, I would take it with a pinch of salt! The other main point about the Trinity is that it is about relationship. God is a relationship, within God's self – God the creator, the eternal being, joined with God incarnate who lived a human life as Jesus, and God the Holy Spirit – guide, helper and sustainer.

Today's gospel reading from John, contains perhaps the best-known sentence from scripture – 'For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son...' but I hadn't realised until this week, when I read a commentary on [workingpreacher.com](http://workingpreacher.com), that this well-known passage shows Jesus discussing in some detail all three persons of the Trinity. Not in an intellectual, theological way, but Jesus challenges Nicodemus to move from theory to practice, from knowledge to faith, from curiosity to commitment. Nicodemus thinks that as a religious leader he understands who Jesus is and who God is. Jesus calls his assumptions into question. Like a typical scholar, Nicodemus begins the conversation with a statement based on evidence. "We know" that Jesus is a teacher come from God. How do we know? By observation, logic, and deduction. Jesus' signs provide convincing proof that God is with him. But Nicodemus' conclusion is partial and incomplete. Lacking both courage and commitment, he has come to visit Jesus by night. Far from being a follower of Jesus, he is unwilling even to be seen with him.

Jesus responds to Nicodemus by saying that no one can see God's reign without being born again from above. Unless Nicodemus allows God to change his whole way of being in the world, he will not be able to perceive God at work. Nicodemus promptly demonstrates his lack of spiritual perception by taking Jesus at the most literal level. Mystified, he asks, "How can anyone be born after growing old?" Jesus explains that by water and the Spirit God gives people rebirth into the reign of God. Those who are reborn in this way become spiritual beings, shaped and sustained by the Spirit who bears them. And so, we have the Trinity – Jesus, the Son, talking about God and the Holy Spirit.

In his conversation with Nicodemus Jesus refers to all three persons of the Trinity. God is the One who loves the cosmos and who, unwilling to let it perish, gives the Son. God sends the Son not to condemn the world and its inhabitants, but to rescue and restore them. The Greek word translated as 'saved' means save in the sense of heal and make whole. Jesus is both the only Son of God and

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the human one, the Son of Man. He descended from heaven and has ascended to heaven, thus connecting heaven and earth. He remains in constant contact with God the Sender, revealing God by bearing witness to what he has seen and known. Those who place their trust in Jesus will have eternal life, being reborn by the Spirit. The Greek word for Spirit can mean spirit, breath, and wind, and Jesus plays with this ambiguity. Like the breath of God in Genesis, the Spirit gives life to believers. Like the wind, God's Spirit blows wherever it wishes, and those who are born of the Spirit share in this mysterious freedom. While people can sense the presence of the Spirit, they can neither comprehend nor control it.

The eternal life that the gift of God's Son gives is life shaped by, and utterly dependent on, God's love. It is not simply life in heaven after death. It begins now, in the moment that believers entrust their lives to Jesus. When we receive eternal life, we enter into God's reign in the here and now. We become citizens of God's kingdom depending on the Holy Spirit's guidance. Citizenship in God's reign is not a solo affair. Believers are reborn into God's new family. Just as God is in relationship in the Trinity, so we are in relationship with God and with each other.

Our second reading from Romans, is complicated and again not one that I had previously thought of as talking about the Trinity. But let us focus on just two verses: 'all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God... you did not receive a spirit of slavery... but a spirit of adoption.' Central to this text is the affirmation that Christians are children of God by adoption, having been claimed by the Spirit of God. No one can acquire this status through observance of the law or any merit of their own, as we read elsewhere in the letter to the Romans. Setting aside that often in real life, adopted children are desperate to find their birth parents, in the best cases, to be adopted means to be chosen, included, and loved. To be longed for and desired desperately. God has claimed us. God has adopted us as his very own, because God so loved all of creation that he gave his only Son to redeem it. The foundation of Christian life is an active awareness that we have been brought into the very life of the Triune God, where we are loved, secure, and empowered by God's Spirit. This gift is what enables us to reflect Christ in our daily lives.

We would probably like the text to end there so that we can ponder the vast privileges that have been bestowed on us as children of God. But Paul goes on to remind us that suffering is an inevitable part of sharing in the life of the crucified and resurrected Christ – "we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him". Paul goes on to talk of the sufferings of the present time, and we certainly have known suffering in the past 14 months. Even if we have not had Covid19 ourselves, or known someone who has, we have had our liberty taken away; all that we took for granted and thought was a given was swept away – going to church on a Sunday, hugging loved ones, being able to leave our homes for something other than food shopping or collecting medication, socialising, going on public transport without a mask... I could go on, but you can all think of many examples, and yet they pale into insignificance when set beside countries like India or Brazil.

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Just as we are united with Christ in joy so are we united with Christ in pain. No one is an island; we are all connected. We have learnt this in the pandemic – that we are dependent on those we looked down on before – supermarket shelf fillers, cleaners, hospital porters. We have all experienced the pandemic differently, but we have also experienced it together, in relationship, connected while we were physically more separate than ever. We are united with Christ, in the Triune God, in the good times and the bad, in the joy and the pain, and so too are we called to support each other in all circumstances and all times, without prejudice or discrimination, linked together as the body of Christ, made in the image of God.

**Lord's Supper**

We remember, as we do at every communion service, the gift of the life and death of God's Son, our Lord Jesus Christ. Come to this table, you who are beloved in Christ. Come, not because you must, but because you may.

Lift up your hearts.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

**It is right to give our thanks and praise.**

Loving God, the world you made is beautiful and full of wonder.  
You made us, with all your creatures, and you love all that you have made.  
You gave us the words of your prophets, the stories of your people throughout the generations, and the gathered wisdom of many years.  
You gave us Jesus, your Son, to be born and to grow up in difficult times where there was little peace.  
He embraced people with your love and told stories to change us all.  
He healed those in pain and brought to life those who had lost hope.  
He made friends with anyone who would listen and loved even his enemies.

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For these things, he suffered. For these things, he died.  
And he was raised from death and lives with you forever.  
You give us your Holy Spirit, to teach and to strengthen us,  
to remind us of Jesus Christ and to make us one in him.  
For all these gifts we thank you, and join with all your people  
on earth and in heaven, in joyful praise, saying:

**Holy, holy, holy Lord  
God of power and might,  
heaven and earth are full of your glory.  
Hosanna in the highest.  
Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord.  
Hosanna in the highest.**

This is the mystery of faith:

**Christ has died  
Christ is risen  
Christ will come again.**

Send your Holy Spirit upon this bread and wine,  
and upon your people, that Christ may be with us,  
and we may be ready to live for you  
and do what you ask of us, today and every day to come. **Amen**

On the night when he was betrayed, Jesus took bread and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, this is my body which is broken for you. Do this in remembrance of me.
