Our Bible reading today is from **Mark 4.35-41**

In the evening, after teaching all day from a boat, Jesus said to his disciples, 'Let's cross over to the other side of the lake.' * So, leaving the crowds behind them on the shore, they sailed across the water. Some other boats sailed with them.



Suddenly, a fierce and violent storm began. The wind roared and huge waves crashed into the boat, threatening to sink it. Jesus was fast asleep in the back of the boat, with his head on a cushion, and seemed completely unaware of the danger. But the disciples were terrified! They woke him up saying, 'Jesus, wake up! Don't you care that we are about to drown?'

Jesus got up and rebuked * the roaring wind and said to the angry sea, 'Peace! Be still!' Immediately the wind dropped and the sea became completely calm. Jesus turned to his disciples and said, 'Why are you so frightened? Do you still have no faith?' The men stood in awe and amazement and said to each other, 'Who is this man? Let's talk about our Bible verses

Today's readings are all about stormy seas and God rescuing us, aren't they. Have you ever been out in a boat when it's really stormy? I have! When I was at school, we went on a trip across the channel, eventually ending in Germany. School trips rarely went by aeroplane when I was at school as it was a lot cheaper to go by boat. This particular trip the storm came and the ferry we were on was pitching up and down in the waves, making most people seasick. My friend and I decided we wanted to be up top where we could see the waves and feel and the sea water as it was carried by the wind. It was very exciting, and a little bit scary as we made our way around the deck, we had trouble staying on our feet as the boat moved with the waves and we had to hold tight onto the railings!

In our second reading today, Jesus' friends, the disciples, were in a small fishing boat, which must have been much more frightening than being in a big ferry. Jesus was asleep when the storm came, and the disciples were really frightened that the boat would sink. They didn't know what to do and turned to Jesus, waking him up. Do you turn to Jesus when you don't know what to do?

Then Jesus was able to stop the storm and the lake calmed so that they could reach the shore safely. But instead of thanking Jesus, they were amazed that he had been able to stop the storm, asking each other, "Who is this man who even the wind and waves obey?"

This is similar to how we pray sometimes, we ask God for things, but we don't really expect God to be able to do them. We don't have faith. But God can help us if we have faith. It's not always easy to believe, but when we do, great things can happen.

Let's talk to God now:

Jesus, we know that
after the storm there will be calm.
Bring peace to those who worry,
who are fearful and who doubt.
Help us to have faith and believe in you.

Amen.

May the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ (Hold out hands as if expecting a present)

And the love of God (Put your hands on your heart)

And the fellowship of the Holy Spirit (Hold hands)

Be with us all now and for ever. Amen! (raise hands together on the Amen)
