Competition announcement! This is well in advance, so you have plenty of time to start creating –


URC at 50: Worship Resources Competition

To celebrate the URC's 50th anniversary (2022), choirs, bands, individuals, songwriters, composers, and poets are invited to submit an entry into the URC at 50: Worship Resources Competition.

There are four categories in which you can enter:

- traditional hymn/song
- poem
- contemporary hymn/song
- rap

Judges will select a winner from each category. Winning entries will be included in a digital version of the URC at 50 resource pack for local churches for them to use in jubilee celebrations and/or Sunday services.



The closing date for entries is **8 April 2022**, and winners will be publicly announced at General Assembly in **July 2022**.

- To enter, you must be a member or active adherent of a URC or URC Youth.
- Entries can be new lyrics submitted to existing music within the public domain.
- Entries must have a jubilee/URC at 50 anniversary theme and be suitable for use in collective worship.
- Musical entries to new tunes must include lyrics plus musical score (PDF or JPG) and/or an audio recording (MP3 or MP4).
- The competition is open to people of any age.
- One entry per person/group.



TIPS & IDEAS

This week's idea from #64MillionArtists is another word based 'challenge':

Find a piece of writing that you love. Perhaps it's something you've written that you would love to share with others. Or it could be a poem or an extract from a book. **Read it out loud.** Try out different ways that your piece could be read.

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Read it quickly, then slowly, pause after every word or don't pause at all. How does the meaning change? Which version do you prefer? Which version brings out the meaning of your words most effectively? Experimenting with the different ways that your piece can be read will help you craft a performance that is unique to you and to your writing.

I suspect not many of us have written work we would want to perform! But it is interesting to see how the meaning changes when you read things out loud – try it with your favourite Bible passage.

This week the ninth and final item from the **9 things you can do about climate change** – (I think you may have had this before while I was on holiday, but it doesn't hurt to have it again!)

9. Talk about the changes you make

As you make positive changes to reduce your environmental impact, share your experience with your family and friends. Don't be a bore or confrontational. Instead, talk positively, and be honest about the ups and downs. Tell people that Christ Church is an Eco Church and we really care about saving the planet!

ECO RESTORATION: OCEANS AND COASTS

(Taken from UN Eco Restoration Project 2021)

We can restore oceans and coasts by reducing the pressures on them so they can recover, both naturally and with our help. We need to make these ecosystems and communities more resilient in the face of global change. Here are some ways we can help:

Oceans and seas cover more than 70 per cent of the Earth. These ecosystems regulate our climate and generate most of the oxygen we breathe. They underpin key economic sectors, such as tourism and fisheries. And they harbour biodiversity from, whales to plankton, in habitats from sun-lit reefs to polar oceans.

But oceans and coasts face huge threats. Millions of tonnes of our plastic waste are harming creatures, including seabirds, turtles and crabs. Climate change is damaging coral reefs and we are clearing mangroves for fish farms and other activities. Overfishing threatens fish stocks, nutrient pollution is creating dead zones, and we discharge nearly 80 per cent of our wastewater without treatment.



Clean up: Mobilize all ages to gather the masses of household waste and abandoned fishing gear that wash up on our beaches and shores. Recycle plastics and other materials to keep them out of landfill. Stop using avoidable and unnecessary plastic products. Watch out for microbeads and microplastics hidden in products! The more people take part, the more awareness grows of the need to reduce waste and dispose of it properly

Restore vegetation above and below the water:

Protect and restore coastal ecosystems including saltmarshes, mangroves, coral reefs, sea-grass meadows and shellfish beds to boost their diversity and the habitats and benefits they provide. All ecosystems are complex, so get expert advice for your location. Did you know, for example, that seagrass beds store 18 per cent of oceanic carbon, and are 35 times faster than rainforests in doing so? They are also critical feeding grounds for seahorses and manatee, who might otherwise not survive. Get to know your local oceans and coasts and help bring back what makes them special.

Use the ocean wisely: Bring together communities, authorities and other stakeholders to agree how to make coastal and ocean development and fishing sustainable, for instance by creating protected areas and deciding who can access which resources. If fishing communities come together and jointly decide on protected areas and fishing zones in their waters, people and nature benefit. Use citizen scientists to monitor the impact of degradation and the benefits of restoration.

Find out more:

Help the CleanSeas campaign to turn the tide on plastic. Consult the International Coral Reef Initiative's guidelines for restoring reefs and global restoration database. Check out this seagrass restoration project in the United Kingdom or this practical guidance on restoring native oyster beds. Seek expert advice for your ecosystem and location from the Society for Ecological Restoration.
