Bible readings: **Psalm 37:1-11, 39-40**
 Luke 6:27-38

Both of today's readings are very hard – not the words, the words are quite easy – but what we are asked to do. The first from Psalm 37 tells us not to worry and that wrongdoers will get their comeuppance, yet we all know that people who do wrong, who lie and break the rules, who bully others or do their jobs really badly and endanger others, rarely get what is coming to them. And while the pandemic seems to be easing off now, there is still plenty to worry about if you watch or listen to the news, and there is always the worry that case rates will go up again, or we will get another different variant, especially as the government is planning to remove all restrictions, more to make itself popular than because anything scientific suggests that is a good idea! I won't mention any of the long list of things from the news that we could worry about as we're supposed to put our trust in God and not worry, and I'm sure you can think of plenty of things without me listing them! Even away from the news and media, there are many things to worry about – there seem to be many people in our congregation and at Bridgwater Drive, struggling with illness at the moment, with end of life issues or with bereavement. And trusting in God at those times can be hard – when it

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seems like the diagnosis is too much to bear, or the pain will never get any less, but I know from personal experience that I felt the presence of God more while my mum was dying than at any other time in my life. And many people say that it is at just such difficult times that they rely on and trust in God the most. When things are so bad, what is left but to trust in God?

In our Gospel reading from Luke, we are told to love our enemies, treat others as we would like them to treat us – what is known as the Golden Rule – and we are told to turn the other cheek – none of which is easy. This follows on from last week's reading in which Jesus outlines a shorter version of the beatitudes – those who are blessed, and balances it with those who are not blessed but should take warning. To re-cap:

Blessed are the poor – not the poor in spirit, but only poor, so this could be interpreted as those without the things they need in life like homes and clothes.

Blessed are those who are hungry – again, not those who hunger for justice as in the longer version in Matthew's Sermon on the Mount, but simply those who are hungry which could be for food or possessions, love or justice, compassion or companionship, spiritual hunger – there are many ways to be hungry.

Blessed are those who weep – is what Luke says, rather than Matthew's 'mourn', but both weeping and mourning come to everyone at some point in their lives, so this one really speaks to everyone.

And finally, blessed are those who are hated or rejected on account of following Jesus. Instead of 4 more blessings, Luke then gives us 4 woes, or warnings, which are the opposites of the 4 blessings: to the rich, to those who have plenty now, to those who are laughing now, rather than weeping, and to those who are praised by all – people with prestige or high social standing. These blessings and woes describe a world that reverses almost everything we know of how things work. It completely overturns the status quo – it is not the rich and distinguished who are blessed in God's kingdom, but the poor and hungry, the widows and orphans, those most excluded from society. And in today's verses Jesus continues with that overturning of the world we know, a world where the bullies and the rich and powerful always seem to win.

After warning those who don't follow God's ways what life will be like for them, Jesus goes on to describe how those who are in a relationship with God, who trust God and follow Jesus, are called to live; how we should behave. Jesus will bring about a very different world, God's world and we have a part to play in that. God will level the playing field no matter what rules we have established to create and protect our positions, power and social standing. The thriving of all creatures in God's world requires a completely different way of

doing things from those humans have put in place. Jesus lists commands that describe behaviour for those of us still listening. The very first command, 'love', is followed by some quite concrete examples – **love** your enemies, not just your family and friends, even the bad people love those they like - **do** good; don't just think well of people you don't like or don't agree with, but do good too. **Pray** for, **bless**, **give**, and **do** to others as you would have them do to you. Jesus then goes on with more actions – things we should not do – do not judge or condemn. Forgive and you will be forgiven. And then Jesus appears to give us a cocktail recipe (at least in the NRSV) – 'a good measure, pressed down, shaken [not stirred] together, running over, will be put in your lap, for the measure you give will be the measure you get back.'

Those who follow Jesus are to live and act as God lives and acts - mercifully and being generous beyond expectation, beyond comprehension. Those who don't follow Jesus, love, lend, and do good but only in the expectation of receiving something in return. They don't love their enemies, but only others like them, their like-minded friends. But for us as disciples, followers of Jesus, for people who trust God, loving, lending, and doing good are all about generosity that does not draw boundaries based on other people's responses. We are to love and do good to all, even our enemies and those who curse and abuse us. The golden rule – do to others as you would have them do to you - is insufficient for those in a relationship with God, those who trust God. Our own wishes for how we want to be treated are no measure for how we treat others. God's mercy and love is to be the measure for our behaviour. So take up your cocktail shaker and mix up a life of service like Jesus' – a good measure of love, plenty of doing, a splash of prayer, pressed down with giving and shaken together until your cup runs over with the love and mercy of God!
