Psalm 32

Sermon

My talk this morning is based on our reading from John's gospel. Some scholars believe that certain parts of this gospel have become displaced and that might be the case here as the reading begins "Now six days before the Passover", which would indicate timewise it was getting really close to the last supper and Jesus' final entry into Jerusalem, knowing that he would be betrayed and that he would die in the cross.

That said this is one of my favorite gospel stories. Jerusalem would be crammed with people all wanting to be there for the Passover feast and as per usual demand for accommodation outstripped supply. So at Bethany, one of the places outside the city walls that was designated as a place for pilgrims to stay if Jerusalem was full.

He was with Lazarus, whom Jesus has earlier raised from the dead, Mary and Martha and they had prepared a meal for him. It was then that this wonderful story of Mary's heart overflowing with love takes place. She had a pound of spikenard, a precious and expensive aromatic ointment with which she anointed Jesus feet. Judas criticized her actions as sheer waste. Jesus then gives a glimpse into what is about to happen, by saying to Judas that money could be given to the poor at any time, but a kindness done to him had to be carried out now as the time remaining for such a gift would soon disappear forever.

Within this story there are a three character sketches of Martha, Mary and Judas. However, this morning I want to concentrate on Martha and Mary.

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Firstly there is Martha. She was serving at table and also loved Jesus. However, she was a practical woman and showed her love by the work of her hands. Martha always gave what she could. Many great men and women have been what they were because someone lovingly cared for them at home out of the public eye. Here we are being told it is just as possible to serve Jesus in the kitchen – and here I think of the team who serve teas and coffees after the service as well as the team that prepares the special meals we have in the Caley Hall – as on the public platform or in a career lived in the public gaze.

Secondly there is the character of Mary. She was the one who above all loved Jesus and here in her actions we see three things about love:

We see love's extravagance, for Mary took the most precious thing she possessed and spent it all on Jesus. Love is not love if it calculates down to the penny what it cost. It gives its all with only one regret that it cannot give more.

We see love's humility. It is a sign of honour to anoint a person's head. In Psalm 23 verse 5 the psalmist says "You may anoint my head with oil", Mary, however would not even consider doing this, She thought she was not good enough to do this and instead anointed his feet.

We see love's unselfconsciousness. Mary wiped Jesus' feet with her hair. In Palestine once a woman was married, her hair was bound up and remained so and she would never be seen in public with long tresses flowing loose. It was the sign of an immoral woman, yet Mary never even thought of that. When people are in love they tend to live in a world of their own. The wander down the street holding hands not caring what other people think. Even now I can hear my mother's voice criticisng young people for doing just that. Many of us, I think, would be extremely self-conscious about showing or even speaking about their Christianity, so concerned are they about rejection or being laughed at for being a Christian. But in this story here is Mary, who loved Jesus so much that she could not care less what other people thought. I remember many years ago waiting for my twin to arrive at Waverly Station late on a Friday evening. These two young people approached me and asked

if I believed in Jesus. I was so astonished by their confidence in asking the question that I replied in the affirmative and had a wonderful conversation with them. They certainly had no inhibitions in talking about their faith.

Yet to me there is one more theme running as an undercurrent as we read this story. Jesus was about to do something that other people might think of as rash. He was going to head into the lion's den to face betrayal, rejection and death on the cross.

But this Jesus did not care what other people thought, for he knew that his death was a sign of God's love – as we read in John 3 v 16 and 17 "For God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in Him might not die but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to be its judge but to be its saviour". Halleluia"

As we approach Easter with Jesus hanging from the cross on Good Friday and the empty tomb on Easter Sunday, let us remember the gift God gave us in the form of his son who overcame death on the cross, so that those who believed in him could have everlasting life and their sins forgiven. **Amen**
