Where do we feel safe? (Rachel Squire to talk about where she feels safe.)

Sandy to talk about the Greenbelt festival with slides.

- I've been going to Greenbelt for a few years now, and it has become a place of refuge, a safe place, for me and my daughter. We feel we can go there and be ourselves, for just one weekend a year, it has become a place we can relax, enjoy each other's company, and try out new experiences together, away from the usual everyday constraints that life throws our way.
- But why do I feel it's a safe space? Firstly, you may wonder that a festival full of people I don't know, would become this place of safety for us. Well, Greenbelt isn't any old festival, it started almost 50 years ago, and now has partners that support Greenbelt each year, such as Christian Aid, The Methodist Church, the trussell trust,

the Arts council of England and of course the United Reformed Church. This is how they describe themselves:

- WHAT IS GREENBELT?

- We're somewhere artistry meets activism, the secular meets the spiritual, politics
 meets positivity. We're somewhere to come together once a year, where we're just
 as likely to dream up a better world as we are to dance and debate, to pray and to
 party (ideally all of those things at the same time).
- Greenbelt is different to other festivals, it's greener, friendlier, you can put your bag down, wander off and it's still there when you get back, (or someone's handed it in to lost property for you). You can make new friends, these two, Annie and I met at the communion service on Sunday morning, a lovely couple, called Bill and Val who were in their 80s; we went to the communion service nice and early to get a good position on the grass with our picnic blanket – it's what everyone tries to do, and then you realise that you have to make friends, because the communion bag is for 10 people not two, so you then ask around you, "are you with others? Would you like to join us?" And you make friends, chat and find out about each other while waiting for the service to start. And then the service starts – it's an amazing time of joining with thousands of others – the whole of Greenbelt stops for the Sunday morning communion, and we sing and we hear stories, this year was all about our climate and what the world might look like in 30 years' time. And I wept with others as we sang a new version of all things bright and beautiful, which was very difficult to sing and the voices of others slowly petered out as they realised the words they were expected to sing;
- Each little flower that opens, Each little bird that sings, Is tainted with the plastic,
- We've thrown into our bins.
- All things bright and beautiful, All creatures great and small, God who made the universe,
- Looks out on us appalled.

The service half way through turned around and we looked at things as they might be if only, we all did whatever we could to help. A sobering service and one where we all had the chance to make promises to do what we can.

- And this is why it is my safe space a place where like-minded people gather and any one, whoever they are, can feel able to express their views, their beliefs and their hopes. You can join in discussions on religion, gender, colour, the climate, in fact most topics that are current, without fear of being shouted down, everyone's opinions matter. Or you can listen and dance along to live music, listen to new and topical poetry, enjoy live comedy, watch weird and exciting circus acts, chill in the URC tent and listen to a children's story, or do some mindfulness colouring, learn to sing harmonies with folk songs, in fact there is something for everyone, including a very large programme of events for children.
- Next year is the 50th year for Greenbelt, and they have made some changes to their costs, so if you are interested the tickets are on sale now and if you are struggling with finances, they have a reduced fee to help, go to their website and check it out.

Enough about Greenbelt – what about this church? Do you feel this is your safe space? Can you worship your God here without fear of how you do it? Can you come here knowing that all are part of the bigger family of church and will welcome you and look after you? I really hope the answer is yes, we've been doing our best to make this a safe place for all, we are part of the Inclusive Church Network, we are a child and youth friendly church and we are a Sight-Loss Friendly Church. We are also an Eco-Church and we're working on becoming a dementia friendly church too. All these things work only if we work together to make them happen.

Mickey: Well, the tree of course! Monkeys love trees!

Sandy: Umm, I'm not sure that was his safe space, but at least he got to see Jesus from

there.

Mickey: well, where do you think then?

Sandy: well, I'm thinking it was his home.

Mickey: Oh, why?

Sandy: Well, he would have felt safe from all the people he upset there.

Mickey: Oh right.

Sandy: And he invited Jesus there. And look what happened when he did!

Mickey: What happened? Did they get to eat bananas? I love bananas!

Sandy: Well, they may have eaten bananas Mickey, but more important that that, Jesus turned Zacchaeus' life around.

Talk: Sandy: Zacchaeus wasn't very well thought of was he? He had cheated people out of money and made himself rich by doing so, which had made him very unpopular, so Zacchaeus didn't have many safe spaces he could go. In fact, when he heard Jesus was coming, and the crowd was so strong, climbing a tree was the only way he could get to see Jesus, as he was so short.

I think the one place Zacchaeus felt safe was his home, which is where he invited Jesus, and that invitation changed his life. After Zacchaeus had decided to give away half of his wealth to the poor, Jesus told him — "salvation has come to this home today".

Have you invited Jesus into your safe place yet?

I would like to think this building is a safe space, and can be for our communities, but it isn't the building that makes it a safe space, it is how we interact with it and the people that use it.

Let's talk to God again now:

Life is a journey, Lord:

let us travel with you.

Reassure us when we don't feel safe:

let us travel with you.

Protect us from all dangers:

let us travel with you.

Amen.

Jesus too had safe spaces that he used, to get away from the crowds and spend time with his Father God.
