Reading: Numbers Ch. 11 vv24-30

Talk 1

I must admit, this is a first for me, taking about a reading from the book of Numbers.

I think that it is fair to say that this Old Testament book is neither well known nor quoted

from frequently, but nonetheless, I felt that the reading still connected with our theme of

Pentecost.

Some will think of testifying to the glory of God. Others will think of the old testament feast,

the fifty days after Passover, when people were to bring evidence of God the Father blessing them. They were to bring the first part of the harvest and celebrate it together.

After Jesus' ascension, Pentecost takes on a similar proof of God's work.

In John 12 verses 23 and 24 Jesus said "The hour has now come for the Son of Man to receive great glory. I am telling you the truth: a grain of wheat remains no more than

a single grain unless it is dropped into the ground and dies. If it does die, it produces many grains." This Jesus was indicating that by his death a plentiful harvest of new lives would be produced. Pentecost is the proof that God's love makes a difference in lives. It is when we realise the word of God does and celebrate the new lives he has created. Pentecost is also the fulfilment of prophetic dreams such as the dream given to Abraham that through his seed, through one of his descendants, the world would be blessed. Other prophesies

in the Old Testament promised salvation, promised restoration, promised that God had not deviated from or abandoned his plan, a plan for his people. In verse 29 from our reading, Moses says: "Are you concerned about my interests? I wish that the Lord would give his spirit to all his people and make all of them shout like prophets" – Sound familiar? In this instance two of the leaders who had not been in the meeting with the other elders and Moses were also shouting like prophets. Joshua wanted Moses to stop them, but he had failed to recognise the work of the Holy Spirit. Surely we need more people to speak up, not based on their understanding, but on God's understanding. People who will speak as God would speak, who prophesy against sin, not to condemn but to remind us all that God will show them mercy. This is why Moses was all for every person being able

to prophesy. This is what Moses wanted – that the Lord would make all his people prophets by filling them with his Holy Spirit.

That is what Pentecost is all about, the struggle to see what God is doing, the life that has come to be, because of the planting of Jesus, the seed of Abraham in the ground. It is about us coming to God and saying "God you are amazing, look at what you are doing here! Look at what your love has planted and your mercy nourished, what the Holy Spirit is creating right here in our lives. **AMEN**

Reading Acts Ch 2 vv 1-21

Talk 2

I was quite intrigued to learn why we celebrate Pentecost when we do, There were three great Jewish festivals - the Passover, Pentecost and the Feast of the Tabernacles to which every male Jew living within twenty miles of Jerusalem was legally bound to come. Pentecost means "fiftieth" and another name for Pentecost was "the Feast of Weeks".

It was so called because it fell on the fiftieth day, a week of weeks, after the Passover. The Passover was celebrated in April so Pentecost fell at the beginning of June.By that time travelling conditions were at their best, so at least as many come to the Feast of Pentecost as came to the Passover, hence the list of countries in this chapter; never was there a more international group in Jerusalem than at the time of Pentecost.

This feast was significant in two ways. Firstly historical significance, commemorating the giving of the law to Moses on Mount Sinai; secondly it had an agricultural significance for at the Passover, the first crop of barley was offered to God; and at Pentecost two loaves were offered in at Pentecost in gratitude for the safe gathering in of the harvest. What really happened at Pentecost, we really do not know, except that the disciples had an experience of power – think back to the lamp that I used as an example – the power of the Holy Spirit flooding their beings as never before.

But what was this all about? The last third of the reading introduces us to one of the basic concepts of both the Old and New Testaments – that of the day of the Lord. The Jews never lost the conviction that they were God's chosen people. They interpreted this to mean that they were chosen for special privilege amongst the nations of the world. They were always a small nation whose history had been one long disaster, think of the exile and the destruction of the temple and the countless attacks by their enemies. It Was painfully obvious that human means would never be the way to reach the status they deserved as the chosen people. Gradually it had dawned on them that what they could not achieve for themselves, God must do and hence they looked forward to a day when God would intervene directly in history and raise them to the honour they dreamed of. The day of intervention was the day of the Lord.

They divide time into two ages. Firstly the present time, utterly evil and doomed to

destruction; and then there was the age to come, which would be the golden age of God. Between the two there was to be the day of the Lord, which was to be the terrible signs of the new age, which some have likened to labour pains before a birth. It

would arrive suddenly, with no warning, like a thief in the night; it would be a day when

the world would be shaken to its very foundations, a day of judgment and terror. Now comes the great revelation!

Peter stands up a says to the Jews that in the form of Jesus that day had come. That day about which they had dreamed for generations was here. Now, although this message was directed to the Jews as would be natural at that time, it is a message that has resounded down the ages for Christians too – in Jesus God arrived in person on the scene of human history, not just for one day, the day of the Lord, but for all time.

The promise that God had made to Abraham, that through his seed, one of his descendants, the world would be blessed. Let us rejoice in it, for he is with us always. **AMEN**
