Bible readings: Genesis 1:1-2 2 Corinthians 13:11-13 Matthew 28:16-20

Today is Trinity Sunday, but apart from the command in the reading from Matthew, there is little related to the Trinity in the set readings for today. This is because the Trinity is not a Biblical concept, apart from what Jesus says in Matthew, and the end of the 2nd letter to the Corinthians it is not something the Bible talks about, it is a doctrine that the church introduced later on. The concept of the Trinity developed significantly during the first four centuries as church leaders sought to defend the faith against heresies that were emerging

such as Adoptionism - the belief that Jesus was an ordinary man, born of Joseph and Mary, who only became the Son of God at his baptism; and other views that taught that the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit were essentially one and the same, the difference being simply verbal, describing different aspects or roles of a single being. It was not until the 4th century that the First Council of Nicaea adopted the Nicene Creed which described Christ as "God of God, Light of Light, very God of very God, begotten, not made, being of one substance with the Father". After many more years of debate, this being of the same 'substance' became the hallmark of Christian orthodoxy and was further developed into the formula of the Trinity - "three persons, one being". The doctrine of the Trinity was used to oppose alternative views of how the three 'persons' are related and to defend the church against charges of worshiping two or three gods.

In Genesis, we could say we have God and the Holy Spirit, but Jesus, God incarnate is not there. God created the heavens and the earth from a dark void. A wind from God swept over the face of the waters. This wind is God's spirit, but it is not the Holy Spirit, the comforter and companion that was given after Jesus had ascended. The reading from 2 Corinthians, is Paul signing off a letter. It is like an extended version of our saying 'best wishes' at the end of a letter or email. It states what we now know as the Grace, which we say regularly. It is a trinitarian sign-off but doesn't tell us anything about the doctrine of the Trinity or extol the virtues of trinitarian thinking. Then we have Jesus' words to the eleven disciples, 'go and make disciples of all nations baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.' These two texts are the only places in the Bible that use a trinitarian formula we would recognise as such, though the Trinity is alluded to in a handful of other places in the New Testament. The Old Testament was determined to show that there was only one God, that the people of Israel should be monotheistic, surrounded as they were by cultures worshipping many gods. And indeed, even in the New Testament, the early Christians were surrounded by Greco-Roman pagans who worshipped numerous gods, so what made Christianity difference was the belief in one God.

Jesus talks often of God the Father, and we heard just last week at Pentecost how Jesus himself gave the disciples the Holy Spirit by breathing on them, so Jesus spoke of all three elements of the Trinity - God, himself, and the Holy Spirit, but he did not indoctrinate his followers in the doctrine of the Trinity because no such thing existed. The Holy Spirit was only given once Jesus had died and gone from the earth. All three elements of the Trinity are never in the same room at the same time as it were. In Genesis we have God and what we could interpret as God's spirit in the wind, but no Jesus. At the beginning of John's

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Gospel we have, 'in the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.' We usually interpret the Word as being Jesus from what comes later in the first chapter of John, but we could, I suppose, interpret it as being the Holy Spirit. What it definitely isn't is God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit all together in the beginning. When Jesus breathed the Holy Spirit into the disciples there is no explicit mention of God, so again, it is only two of the three. Matthew 28 is the only place that gives the trinitarian formula we are used to, in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Yet even there the three elements are not present together, only Jesus. It is a commandment from Jesus to his disciples, like the commandment to love God and love your neighbour.

So why do we hold such store by the Trinity? Why do we say we are Trinitarian, and not for example Unitarian? And is it really important? Does it change any of our lives? Does it make one bit of difference if we think of God as being 3 elements, rather than just one single entity that for a time lived in a human body here on earth?

I suspect in our day to day lives it doesn't make any difference. It was a doctrine formulated to try to understand God, which of course as mortals we can never do, and to protect the early church from heresy. The main time we use the Trinitarian formula, apart from saying the Grace, is in baptism, as commanded by Jesus. Water is necessary, but a person is only baptised, once the words have been spoken: 'I baptise you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.'

Where I think the Trinity can be helpful is in thinking about unity, relationship and community. In Trinitarian doctrine, God exists as three persons but is one being, having a single divine nature; a built-in community. God is three in one, completely undivided and inseparable. The members of the Trinity are co-equal and co-eternal, one in essence, nature, power, action, and will. The Father is uncreated, the Son is uncreated, and the Holy Spirit is uncreated, and all three are eternal without beginning. The Father, Son and Holy Spirit cannot be separate from one another. Each person is understood as having the identical essence or nature. We are not talking about three gods, but only one God with different aspects. I remember one doctrine lecture at college describing the Trinity as gin and tonic – there are three elements, gin, tonic, and ice. Once the ice has melted, it is one indivisible whole, yet you still have three different elements in it!

The Trinity is complicated, and trying to explain it is complicated, if not impossible, but that may be the point. One thing I do understand about the Trinity though is that it is about community and relationships – three different aspects reflected and expressed in one whole. It is the model of how our human communities and interactions should be – harmonious, undivided, caring, yet celebrating the different gifts we all bring to that one

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whole. God is a community, within God's own being. God is not individualistic and selfish as we are. God has a built-in expansiveness, a uniqueness, an undivided sharing between God, Redeemer and Spirit – immortal, invisible, God only wise as the hymn says. We are trying to reach out more to the community we live in. We are also trying to set an example in the way we care for the planet by being an Eco Church and hopefully improving our building to make it more sustainable and so we use less resources. There are also lots of ways we, as individuals, can help to reduce plastic use – take refillable water bottles when we are out and about rather than buying plastic bottles. Try to take re-usable bags when we do our shopping. Repair clothes and buy from charity shops rather than buying new clothes, use soaps and shampoos which are plastic free.

Let us live a Trinitarian life. Even if we don't understand the Trinity – we can praise God our creator, we can follow the example of Jesus and work for justice, and we can be inspired by the Holy Spirit to make small changes in our lives and community, so that those small things can grow into a bigger, indivisible whole working for the good of all.
