You may be surprised to learn that there are three types of baptism mentioned in the Bible, not one. There is the kind of baptism that John the Baptist was doing for the 'forgiveness of sins.' There is Jesus' own baptism, and there is the baptism that Jesus commanded us, his followers, to do when he said, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

John the Baptist was quite a strange man; a wandering tramp, what today we'd call homeless. He wore clothes made from camel's hair and ate locusts and wild honey. Some may even have said he was a sandwich short of a full picnic! He was wandering around the wilderness preaching. To be fair there was a lot of it about back then. There were no TVs, cinemas or smart phones; there wasn't much in the way of entertainment. Going to listen to a preacher out in the middle of nowhere was a day's outing. John the Baptist, as his name might suggest, also baptised people. We are told it was a baptism of repentance to forgive sins. People went into the river Jordan and were baptised by

being submerged and people flocked to do it. So, baptising was definitely a thing before Jesus came along. I can't say that getting baptised in the river Jordan would be my idea of a good time, but there you go. And we hear that Jesus also went to John to get baptised. John wasn't very keen to do it. He knew who Jesus was, and he thought it should be the other way round, Jesus baptising him. In the end, he relented and did it. Without going into too much detail, this was to fulfil a prophecy about Jesus. Jesus' baptism was unique, not just because he was Jesus, but because he was and is the Son of God and this is the first time we hear about it. The Spirit of God descended on him like a dove and a voice from heaven said, 'this is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.' I haven't done many baptisms, but I've seen quite a lot of them, and that never happens. That was a one-time deal just for Jesus.

It's interesting that John says Jesus will baptise with the Holy Spirit and fire, but nowhere in the Bible does Jesus actually baptise anyone. But he does tell his disciples to do it. At the very end of Matthew's Gospel, Jesus says, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

Those are the magic words, if you like, we always baptise in the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit and a baptism must involve water. Usually in United Reformed Churches, especially when it is a baby or child, it is just a little water on the head, but for Jesus it was full immersion in the river Jordan, and some other churches also require people to be fully immersed in water, including putting your head under the water. This is to symbolise dying and being reborn in Christ as you spring up from the water again gasping for breath. Those churches, like the Baptist Church do not baptise children. They think that a person should decide for themselves to follow Jesus and become a Christian, and that person should answer the questions themselves and make their own declarations of faith. This is particularly helpful for people who come to faith later in life and want to make their own declaration of it. In the URC we can baptise children or adults, the only thing we can't do is baptise someone more than once. Baptism is a once in a lifetime thing. I think that might be the only really strict rule there is in the URC, they certainly banged on about it when I was at theological college! When it is a baby being baptised, the parents make the promises on the child's behalf, like Charlotte and Richard did earlier, promising to bring the child up in the life of this particular church here. It is also a way of giving thanks to God for the life of a new baby. When she is old enough, Margot (and Ivy) can decide for herself if she wants to confirm her baptism by becoming a church member. Until she is old enough to make that decision, baptism welcomes her into this church family, where we will surround her with love and teach her about following Jesus. From early times the Church has received the children of believers by baptism so that with help and support they may grow up in Christ, and by the grace of God serve Christ all their days.' In baptism we affirm that the child baptised belongs to God. Of course, all children belong to God, whether we perform the sacrament of baptism or not, but it is symbolic of welcoming the child into the church family and blessing them.

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Jesus himself welcomed children, as we heard in our second reading. He took them in his arms and blessed them. This may seem like a fairly normal thing to do (well setting aside modern safeguarding concerns of course) but in the times when Jesus was alive, women and children were not considered important. They were thought to be the property of their husbands and fathers. If there was no man around, and they were widows and orphans, they were the lowest of the low, barely thought of as part of society and they had to live off the generosity of other family members, because there wasn't any social security or benefits. This is why throughout the Bible we are told to take care of the widows and orphans. Jesus had a special place in his heart for all the people on the edges of society like widows and orphans, the disabled, people with mental health problems and those who were considered ritually unclean by the religious laws of the time because of the work they did or a particular illness they had. When the disciples tried to stop people bringing children to Jesus for him to bless them, he got really cross, and told them not to stop them.

So today we have welcomed and blessed Margot in baptism, and after we sing another hymn we will all be blessed by the other sacrament of our church – Communion.
