Welcome, esp. to anyone new – so glad you decided to join us today. There will be lunch in the Caley Hall, shortly after the service ends, you are all welcome to stay, even if you haven't signed up. Doing things a bit different – for anyone who is new to church I will be explaining why we do different elements of the service (doesn't hurt for those who have been coming a long time to be reminded). A point in general, we usually stand up to sing hymns and stay sitting down for prayers.

A few months ago we agreed that when the worship leader and elders come out of the Vestry (that's the little room back there, where we have a prayer before we start) and everyone stands up, we should bring the Bible in and place it at the front here. This is because we come here on a Sunday morning to worship God, and we believe that the Bible contains the word of God – that is very important so we should stand for that, rather than for the humans coming out as we are all the same – none of us are any better than anyone else.

Put the Bible on the stand

Then we have what is called the Call to Worship. This is a few words said at the beginning to welcome God into our space and our worship service. We might come on a Sunday to meet friends, have a chat, sing, but the main reason is to worship God and learn a bit more about God and about Jesus, so the Call to Worship sets the scene and reminds us what we are doing. Since today we are celebrating Harvest, our Call to Worship and all the songs are on that theme. **Please stand and...**

The harvest season is a great opportunity to reflect on God's provision for us and God's blessing for others. It can help us practice gratitude, even in difficult times, and connect us

with the God who is here, whose Spirit is with us and works through us. It can help us be grateful for all the good things we have and to think about the treasures, the amazing things that are around us.

In this reading from John's Gospel, Jesus, his mother Mary, and his disciples attend a wedding in a village called Cana. At this time, weddings lasted for days, and hospitality was a sacred duty. If you did not provide enough wine or food for your guests, you could be looked down on – it would be very embarrassing. So, when Mary notices that the wine has run out at this wedding, it poses a real problem for the family hosting the party.

The huge stone water jars nearby hold 20-30 gallons of water each, and Jesus asks the servants to fill them to the brim with water and then serve some to the person in charge of the banquet. The water had become wine and, as we read, the person was amazed at the quality of the wine: "But you have kept the good wine until now."

If we read the story carefully, we notice that Jesus did not perform this miracle alone. His mother, Mary identified that the wine had run out, saying "They have no wine." And she put her trust and faith in Jesus: "Do whatever he tells you." Then, the servants poured the new wine for others to enjoy – not just any wine, but the best wine.

This story is about transformation. It is about changing things. It's about living and thinking differently about the gifts God has given us and using them to make a difference. When we encounter problems to be fixed, can we see them instead as an opportunity for transformation, a calling to do something new?

The best wine was created from gifts that were already in the room but were initially overlooked. It required looking around the environment, discerning what was useful, and using items for a purpose that was greater than the sum of their parts. What hidden treasures, gifts, skills are in our community? Where can we identify need, and what will we use to fill it? After we sing our next hymn we will be doing an activity to look at this.

We can have a part to play in Jesus' transforming work too. Sometimes we need to step up like Mary and identify what has run out – even if we don't know how to fill it up. Sometimes we need to be servants to fill the jars and to carry and pour the new wine, sharing goodness and helping others to participate. Through all this, we need to put our trust and faith in Jesus, asking him to show us our jars of water, the gifts we might have overlooked.

This Harvest, we are encouraged to reflect on the part Jesus is calling us to play in His transforming work. When has the wine run out for our community? The wine of justice and equality, hospitality and welcome? Where are our jars of water? The gifts that already exist; the potential for change that is already at hand but overlooked and unlikely?

Prayers of intercession – Explain – ask if there are particular things people want to pray for?

We thank you, God, for bread:
Bread, the basis of the food we eat,
bread for toast, for sandwiches, for bread and jam,
bread for bread pudding and bread for buns —
and bread that is broken and shared in communion with one another,
in remembrance of the night when Jesus sat with his friends at supper,
and broke the bread and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body broken for you."
We thank you, God, for bread, and for all your goodness to us. Amen
