## Children leave for Sunday Club

Readings: Mark 10:13-16 Romans 14:7-9

We are currently in the season of remembrance. This week we celebrated, or at least many denominations of the church celebrated, All Saints Day and All Souls, when we remember Christian martyrs and all those who have died. Today we do a different kind of remembering – 'Remember, remember the 5<sup>th</sup> of November, gunpower, treason and plot' though I suspect most people have forgotten that rhyme, if they ever knew it, along with 'penny for the guy' and the reason we have fireworks at all; though given the anti-Catholic sentiment that went along with the festivities originally, that's probably a good thing. I often wonder, where is Guy Fawkes when you need him, but joking aside, on balance it is good to celebrate that the Houses of Parliament were not blown up. I thought I'd better check my history of Bonfire Night and learnt the second part of the rhyme, which I don't ever remember saying: 'We see no reason, why Gunpowder treason, should ever be forgot' (anyone know that?) And it certainly hasn't been, firework displays, up and down the country happen almost religiously. Another thing I learnt was that in the aftermath of the failure of the Gunpowder Plot, Parliament declared November 5 a national day of thanksgiving. So Clare and Ollie, feel free to declare the date of Effie's baptism a day of thanksgiving in your household.

I've been thinking a lot about life and death this week. Aside from All Saints and All Souls, last week Colin, the director of three local choirs, of which some of us are members, died suddenly. On Monday I went to the funeral of a friend who had also died quite suddenly and relatively young and on the way there my journey was disrupted by someone killed by a train at Rayleigh Station. And of course, every day on the news we still hear of the thousands dying in Israel and Gaza. Every minute

of every day, someone, somewhere dies. But also every minute of every day someone is born. In fact, it is every second. There are actually websites that count these things, and you can see the numbers spinning round. Currently, worldwide, though perhaps not so much in Europe, births outnumber deaths by about 2:1. New life comes forth, every second, which is good to remember in the midst of so much bad news. And today we celebrate that. Baptism is a welcome into God's family. It is a sacrament of the church, a rite of passage, a ceremony to mark a stage in life and to mark God's welcome. In some way it's an excuse for a party – we don't really need it to know that everyone of us is loved and welcomed by God, but it is good to celebrate that fact. Baptism, when it is of an infant, also celebrates a new life. It gives thanks for the birth of a healthy child. In his letter to the Romans, Paul reminds them that we belong to God – in life and death. 'If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so whether we live or die, we are the Lord's.' It is often said when someone dies, as a way to provide comfort, that our life is not our own, it belongs to God. I'm not sure how much comfort that offers if someone dies young, though in the eulogy in Monday's service, his brother said, that Keith had pointed out before he died that it was the quality of life that matters, not the quantity, which I think is true and can be applied to most things, though I think Claudia would beg to differ when it comes to chocolate!

We could have read another section of Pau's letter to the Romans today, from chapter 6. There Paul tells his audience that all of us who have been baptised into Christ Jesus were baptised into his death. 'We have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life.' Not quite such festive imagery so close to Halloween! But I like that Paul does not talk of eternal life, but that 'we might walk in newness of life.' As Christians we walk in that newness of life, no matter what life might throw at us. In baptism, in particular we are called to follow Christ, in good times and bad, life and death.

In adult baptism, or believer's baptism as it is sometimes called, this imagery is more noticeable. Such baptisms are usually by full immersion to symbolise dying and being reborn in Christ as you spring up from the water again gasping for breath. Some churches, like the Baptist Church do not baptise children. They think that a person should decide for themselves to follow Jesus and become a Christian, and that person should answer the questions themselves and make their own declarations of faith. This is particularly helpful for people who come to faith later in life and want to make their own declaration of it. In the URC we can baptise children or adults. When it is a young child being baptised, the parents make the promises on the child's behalf, promising to bring the child up in the life of the church. When she is old enough, Effie can decide for herself if she wants to confirm her baptism by becoming a church member. Until she is old enough to make that decision, baptism welcomes her into this church family, where we will surround her with love and teach her about following Jesus. 'From early times the Church has received the children of believers by baptism so that with help and support they may grow up in Christ, and by the grace of God serve Christ all their days.' In baptism we affirm that the child baptised belongs to God, as we all do. All of

us belong to God, whether we perform the sacrament of baptism or not, but it is symbolic of welcoming the child into the church family and blessing them.

Jesus himself welcomed children, as we heard in our first reading. He took them in his arms and blessed them. This may seem like a fairly normal thing to do but in the times when Jesus was alive, women and children were not considered important. They were thought to be the property of their husbands and fathers. If there was no man around, and they became widows and orphans, they were the lowest of the low, barely thought of as part of society and they had to live off the generosity of other family members, because there wasn't any social security or benefits. This is why throughout the Bible we are told to take care of the widows and orphans. Jesus had a special place in his heart for all the people on the edges of society like widows and orphans, the disabled, people with mental health problems and those who were considered ritually unclean by the religious laws of the time because of the work they did or a particular illness they had. When the disciples tried to stop people bringing children to Jesus, he became indignant, and told them not to stop them. He took them in his arms and blessed them. The same Jesus who cried at the death of his friend Lazarus. Jesus like us, experienced the joy of birth and the sadness of death. In baptism we die with Christ, but through Christ we also walk in the newness of life.
