


Adopt a Family Project

After a very long day travelling on Monday, we were up early to meet our old friend Nicu Bogatiou, for breakfast on Tuesday morning, to discuss our itinerary for visiting the three families that we support.

As usual, we have already sent individual reports to the wonderful supporters of this project.

Last year our newsletter featured a lovely lady called Jenita Hutana, and she was our first port of call for this visit, and am pleased to announce that despite her many health issues and physical challenges in life, she welcomed us again into her humble home.

This year we would like to re-visit the Istrate family and our old friend Maria Zanet, whom we have been supporting for many years.



Earlier in the year, Nicu replaced the old bath with a shower unit, which George, with only one leg, and his wife Lucia are very pleased with and gave us a demonstration!

Despite George's multiple health issues, which now include Diabetes, Prostate and Heart problems, he remains extremely positive minded and thankful.

Our old friend Maria lives alone in a small one room apartment in the 'run down' area of the town. Maria's room is adorned with various photographs and icons of the Orthodox church, and a photograph of her son Bogdan, who is a priest in a monastery in the countryside has pride of place


Maria has multiple health issues, which now include Myopia, but like the cancer that she was diagnosed with some 16 years ago, she resolutely refuses any medical intervention!



Casa Esme

Our visit to Casa Esme continues to be one of the highlights of our annual trip to Barlad. The school for mentally and physically handicapped children is primarily funded by Myosotis UK and local government grants, and a small amount of financial assistance from the Crestin Trust.

From inception the goal has been to help youngsters back into main line education, and the scope of their work has expanded to working with the parents, providing them with counselling and encouraging them to become actively involved.




Last year, we were able to finance the purchase of specialist equipment from OMFA, which arrived in time for Christmas – as you can see from the photographs taken during the year, the equipment is being well used!

Our visit this year coincided with the Annual Assessment, where the whole team meet to discuss the past years activities and share ideas to improve the scope of their invaluable work. John and I were privileged to join one such session, where the subject of “Sensory Diet” was on the agenda.

In 2016 Orchyd UK, a charity based in Ruislip, donated the “Sensory Room” which as you can see provides a small, quiet, compact and safe space for the child to interact with various pieces of equipment, lights etc.

Loredana explained that they wished to extend their work in “Sensory Diet”, but were struggling to find an appropriate course in Romania. Using his IT skills, John (Raine) searched the internet and discovered that there are a number of ‘on-line’ courses available in the UK, at very reasonable prices!



We look forward to hearing more in the future, as we do about the EU funding which Myosotis Romania are currently applying for which will help them develop the great work they are doing.

House of Roses






Earlier in the year, we were able to treat our youngsters to a seaside holiday in Constanta, which is on the Black Sea coast.
